

Nurse Leadership CV Checklist

∀ From Bedside to Boardroom – Make Your CV Speak Leadership

1. Contact Details

- Full name, professional credentials (e.g. RN, BSc Nursing)
- Phone number and professional email address
- LinkedIn profile (if available)
- NMC PIN (optional, not always necessary)

2. Personal Statement (Profile Summary)

- 3–5 lines summarising your leadership mindset and goals
- Mention your current role, years of experience, and clinical specialty
- Include leadership skills (e.g. delegation, supervision, QI involvement)
- Reflect ambition: "Aspiring Band 6 nurse with proven team leadership..."

3. Key Skills

Bullet list of 6–10 skills including both clinical and leadership skills
e.g. Team coordination, mentorship, safeguarding, clinical audits, change management

4. Work Experience

- Clearly list job titles, employers, and dates
- For each role:
 - o Highlight leadership actions: delegation, shift leadership, incident reporting
 - Use action verbs (e.g. led, facilitated, implemented, supported)

 Include measurable outcomes where possible (e.g. reduced handover delays by 30%)

5. Achievements & Projects

- Include any service improvements, audit work, QI projects
- Reflect on how your work supported staff development or patient safety
- Mention nominations or recognitions (e.g. Daisy Awards, Employee of the Month)

6. Education & Qualifications

- List nursing degree, additional certifications, and CPD courses
- Include dates and awarding institutions
- Add leadership-related courses if relevant (e.g. conflict resolution, mentoring)

7. Additional Sections (Optional but Powerful)

- Clinical Governance or Risk Roles
- Student mentorship/preceptorship experience
- Reflective practice contributions
- Research participation or teaching roles

8. Final Checks

- CV is 2 pages max
- No grammatical or spelling errors
- Font is clear and readable (e.g. Arial 11pt or Calibri)
- Saved as PDF (unless NHS jobs require Word)

© Bonus Tip:

→ Tailor your CV to each job description—mirror key phrases from the person specification, especially in the "essential" and "desirable" sections.
